#### **School Voluntary Fund Contribution**

If any parent has not yet contributed towards the voluntary fund and wishes to make a contribution, could we ask that they do so using the payment methods below. Children of parents that do not contribute towards the fund will have equal access to activities. If contributions are low we may however, have to consider reducing the amount of activities we can offer across the year.



### **Playground Opening During the February Half-Term Break**

At the beginning of the half-term break, we will be opening our playgrounds to parents/carers of children within our infant and junior departments.

The playgrounds will be open between 9am and 12pm on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> February.

The infant playground should be used by pupils in Year R/KS1 (Year 2 and under). The junior playground should be used by pupils in Key Stage 2 (Year 3 and over). Siblings who do not attend the school are also welcome to attend.

A staff member will be on hand however, parents/carers are responsible for the supervision and support of their own children. Whilst we will have toilets for children to use, we are unable to provide any drinks or snacks. If any parent/carer would like to bring anything with them, they are more than welcome.

Should this date need to be changed or cancelled, we will post a message on ClassDojo.

### School Uniform

A reminder that all pupils/students, other than our 6<sup>th</sup> Form students and Key Stage 4 college attendees, should come to school dressed in school uniform.

We understand that some variation is helpful in order to meet certain pupil needs, e.g. jogging bottoms rather than traditional school trousers and plain white polo shirts for those who require frequent changes. Official uniform can be purchased from the Schoolwear Centre in Margate (01843 293555) however, we are happy for pupils/students to wear items of the same colour that do not contain the school logo. We ask that parents name all clothing.

Children of all ages need a basic PE kit and pupils may need clothing for more specific activities from time to time, e.g. waterproof jackets and wellington boots for Forest School.

Pupils who attend our Garlinge or Hartsdown satellite classes must wear the uniform of the school they attend.



### **Holidays During Term Time**

At Foreland Fields School, we believe we offer a supportive approach to attendance and encourage our families to contact us should there be any barriers to their child attending school.

An update to attendance guidance was published at the beginning of the new academic year. This guidance reinforces the message that Headteachers are <u>not</u> permitted to agree leave of absence during term time unless they are satisfied that there are exceptional circumstances. The document emphasises that 'a need or desire for a holiday or other absence for the purpose of leisure and recreation would not constitute an exceptional circumstance'. Could I please ask that parents do not book holidays or visits during term time as I am not permitted to authorise them.

Exceptional circumstances could include:

- Service personnel returning from a tour of duty abroad where it is evidenced the individual will not be in receipt of any leave in the near future that coincides with school holidays.
- Where an absence from school is recommended by a health professional as part of a parent or child's rehabilitation from a medical or emotional issue.
- > The death or terminal illness of a person close to the family.
- > To attend a wedding or funeral of a person close to the family.
- Where there are exceptional and unforeseen circumstances that fall outside of the above.

Please note, evidence will be required in each case. It is the decision of the Headteacher how many days a child can be away from school if leave is granted.

### **Children's Mental Health Week**

Between 3<sup>rd</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> February we celebrated Children's Mental Health Week. The theme for the week was 'Know Yourself, Grow Yourself'.

Activities involved pupils/students identifying things they are good at, what they want to get better at, things that make them smile, etc.

We also focused on looking after our bodies and ways that we can stay healthy and well.

We linked in with healthy eating and classes prepared healthy food choices.

### **Rights Respecting School Award – Re-Accreditation Visit**

This term we were visited by an assessor from the UNICEF Rights Respecting Schools Award as part of our re-accreditation for the Gold Level Award.

The assessor met with representatives from our staff, pupils, governors and parents and was very impressed with our school. She spoke to pupils about school council, the things that they enjoy about school and she watched one of Zoe's ballet lessons as well as looking at our hydrotherapy pool. She met pupils from many classes including Penguin Class, who were doing their Drop Everything and Read session and she learnt about enterprise from Grylls Class.

The assessor also looked at our curriculum and the new provision at the Hive.

### The Hive Update

The Hive site continues to be developed. In the coming weeks, the horticulture area will have a new polycarbonate growing tunnel constructed. This will enable our Key Stage 4 and 5 horticulture group to grow a range of plants, including fruit and vegetables. There will also be inclusive planters built, which will enable access by the full range of our students, including wheelchair users. These planters will sit within our sensory garden area, where



the planting will all be chosen to either be edible (apples, soft fruits and herbs) or sensory in nature (nice to touch, smell etc).

The sensory area has had a water feature added. This will provide interactive play opportunities for a range of pupils. There is also a sensory arbor with light and sound panels. As the spring and summer arrive, more and more groups will be taking advantage of the site, accessing the playing fields, cycle path and horticulture areas.

### **The Hive Traineeship**

The Hive offers a day service called 'The Hive Traineeship' offering a wide range of bespoke activities to school leavers with SEND in order to develop social, life and employability skills, all aimed at building independence. The aim of the day service is to support people to develop the skills required to access voluntary or paid employment opportunities. 'The Hive Trainees' will explore their interests and socialise with others, with a focus on health and wellbeing. Each 'Trainee' will be allocated a mentor who will support them, listen to their interests and design a personalised programme with them.

### Thrive at the Hive

The Hive has just launched a new project, 'Thrive at The Hive', offering a wide range of bespoke workshops for those aged 55+ with additional needs and/or disabilities to develop skills in ICT, horticulture and gardening, art, sport and exercise, cookery and life skills. Participants will also get to be involved in a variety of community projects. Participants will explore their interests and socialise with others, with a focus on health and wellbeing.
